Helping Haiti: Bahamas Methodist Habitat

Bahamas Methodist Habitat, an agency of the Bahamas Conference of the Methodist Church has been asked to aid in relief efforts to Haiti. Volunteer pilots with BMH have been flying supplies to Haiti in small planes, reaching many of the outlying areas. So far they have delivered over 50,000 lbs of emergency aid using 28 airplane trips. The majority of this aid has been emergency medical supplies, blankets, towels, generators and high protein food items. They have also evacuated 27 persons with the help of nine private planes from Nassau to Iowa. Supplies are still coming. Candler School of Theology has a long-standing relationship with the Bahamas Conference of the Methodist Church. Several of our students have served as summer interns, many of the pastors in the Bahamas are Candler graduates, and last summer we hosted a group of Bahamian students at Candler's Course of Study Program.
