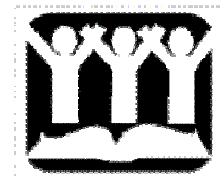

Sukkot is so joyful that it is commonly referred to in Jewish prayer and literature as the Season of our Rejoicing.
