People with mental health problems struggle with psychological difficulties that are frequently destructive, incapacitating, and soul-destroying. Alongside psychological and biological history is a form of social experience that is typically degrading, exclusionary, and dehumanizing. In the minds and actions of the general public, including people of the church and other religious communities, those with mental health problems frequently cease being persons. Instead, they become identified by their pathologies: "schizophrenics," "manic-depressives," or just plain "crazy" substitutes for their primary identity as human beings. Through examining the ancient spiritual practice of hospitality, this presentation will explore ways of conceptually and practically separating people from their illnesses and help religious communities reach out to people with mental illness and their families with love, supportive understanding, and inclusiveness. "Creating an Oasis of Peace: Forgiveness, advocacy, and community"

November 14-16, 2009

Angelina Atyam founded the Concerned Parents Association after her own daughter Charlotte was kidnapped by the Lord's Resistance Army. Angelina has dedicated her life to advocating on behalf of abducted children who are forced to become sex slaves, manual laborers, and child soldiers, and to praying for forgiveness for the abductors. Her radical forgiveness and community organizing stand as a witness to the difference one person can make in the face of injustice. After decades of civil war and the deaths of more than 2 million Sudanese people, **Bishop Paride Taban** decided that the time had come for peace.

In 2005, at the age of 70, Bishop Taban founded the Kuron Peace Village, a community that embodies a holistic commitment to forgiveness, peace, and reconciliation among different ethnic groups and faith communities. Please join us as we learn from these remarkable witnesses!
